UGC Rose Spotlight: Celestial Night

Imagine yourself in a oasis at the UGC Rose Garden strolling through the Pavilion and along the main pathway of the Showcase Rose Garden when you glance to the left and your eyes are drawn to this

gorgeous vibrant purple rose which beckons you to come closer. The strikingly beautiful **Celestial Night** rose is a deep-plum purple Floribunda rose bred by Christian Bédard of Weeks Roses. It was introduced in the United States in 2017 by Spring Hill Nurseries.

Celestial Night has full and floriferous blooms which stand out against its glossy, dark green foliage. Usually borne in clusters, the petals on each flower are arranged in an old-fashioned, quartered, and cupped form and averages 3 to 4 inches in diameter. Celestial Night features very double (multiple of the number of petals on a single bloom) ruffled blooms with a 26 to 40 petal count and a mild fruity fragrance.

If you're thinking that the coloring of *Celestial Night* resembles *Ebb Tide*, another Floribunda by Weeks Roses growing in our UGC Rose Garden, you're right. *Celestial Night* is a cross between *Ebb Tide* and another Weeks Roses variety *Grande Dame*, a Hybrid Tea rose which is also growing in our garden.

Borrowing its somewhat smoky dark purple coloring from *Ebb Tide* in combination with *Grande Dame's* lighter pink hue and the result is a stunning purple rose that almost seems luminous. While one can certainly see that the coloring-characteristics of this rose can be traced back to its lineage, the rose clearly did not inherit strong-fragrance characteristics from its parents. Here in Hawaii, at best, in mid-morning sunshine when oil from its petals are at its peak, *Celestial Night* is just a mild to

moderately fragrant rose.

Sources indicate that the variety can grow to heights of three to fourfeet and widths of two to three-feet. However, in the UGC Rose Garden the **Celestial Night** roses are flourishing three-years after being planted. They currently exceed five-feet in height. The plants have an upright and bushy growth habit and good disease resistance to Black Spot and Powdery Mildew.

Celestial Night recently won the American Garden Rose Selections™ 2022 Regional Choice Award in three regions (South Central, Southeast, and Southwest) and 2022 Fragrance Award Winner.

characteristics of the variety while dozens of other garden visitors passed me by. In fact, my friends had to double back and retrieve me as they had gone on to see other roses and were alarmed to see that I was not following close by in tow.

I did a little research online and discovered very little information about the rose other that it was a Floribunda bred by then amateur rose hybridizer Peter James in the United Kingdom before 2012. It was introduced in Japan by Zen roses in 2012 as *Art Deco* but apparently was never marketed anywhere in the U.S. or United Kingdom. I asked my friend in Japan to find out if there was any other info

available on the variety and he found that it is an easy to grow rose variety recommended for beginners. Art Deco blooms both independently and in clusters all year round in temperate climates. The growth habit of this variety is short and compact growing to a height of only 3 feet tall. Art Deco has a mild fragrance. Source:

Very little else is known about the variety but I suspect that the *Art Nouveau* rose may be one of its parents because that rose was also bred by Peter James and shows similar characteristics. Art Nouveau was hybridized before 2009 and introduced to market only in Australia and the United Kingdom in 2009 making it an equally rare rose here in the U.S.

We called for the special work day to repair the retaining wall against the hillside near Home Depot and also to do extra maintenance work in the UGC Rose Garden.

The wall sustained damage through several heavy rainstorms within the last year and it had become a hazard for anyone walking near the area. A handful of us worked under the direction of **Bob Speer** and **Glenn Fukuda** to clear dirt away from the wall then painstakingly

prepared the foundation with gravel to level it before relaying the heavy concrete retaining wall blocks on each other.

Mahalo to the HRS Weekly Maintenance Crew who concentrated on removing overgrown weeds from the area on Wednesday, January 26, a few days before our work day. Doing that allowed us to make good use of our time on Saturday. Amazingly, many of those crew members also reported for duty on Saturday to help out.

While the wall-repair crew worked on the wall, the rest of us tended to pruning and weeding in the UGC Rose Garden beds under the direction of **Myrna Cariaga**. Remarkably, the rose garden maintenance crew accumulated 15 large trash bags of leaves, stems,

spent blooms, and weeds from the garden that day. All -in-all, we spent about three-hours, from 8:30am-11:30am, in the garden repairing the wall and doing much-needed maintenance in the garden.


The work was definitely made easier because of the number of volunteers who came out to assist us so Mahalo to all who came out to help! **Bob** and **Glenn** will also be

Attendees also harvested and tasted


mamaki tea; propagated plants; tasted unique local fruits; and participated in several other activities while at the UGC Garden.

Kyu Furukawa Gardens was designated as one of only seven National Places of Scenic Beauty in Japan. The garden is located at 1-27-39 Nishigahara, Kita-ku, Tokyo ∓ 114 -0024. There is a nominal admission fee of approximately \$1.50 U.S. and the garden is usually open 9am-5pm. However, it is currently temporarily closed due to the pandemic.
